


Valerie Takata

Prior to her appointment as complex area superintendent in February 2002, Valerie Takata served as Hawaii District superintendent (2001-02) and deputy district superintendent (1999-2001). She was the principal of Keonepoko Elementary (1990-99), and vice principal at Honokaa Elementary and High, and Pahoia High. She also served as District Language Arts Resource Teacher for East Hawaii. She taught English and language arts on Hawaii and Oahu. In addition, she taught for the University of Hawaii at Hilo Teacher Education Program, and with the Tokai University Program. She was selected as the State of Hawaii's National Distinguished Principal while at Keonepoko Elementary. The school also was named a Blue Ribbon nominee for the island. Takata earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Hawaii at Hilo and a master's degree from the University of Hawaii at Manoa.


Total Enrollment Over Time




Enrollment by Racial/Ethnic Group Ten Most Common Categories



High-Needs Enrollment by Type




High-Needs Enrollment by Type Over Time
