

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## Who do we serve?

Community School for Adults is an education program serving adults and students 16 years of age and older. Core services include providing basic elementary, advanced elementary, secondary, and literacy education to adults in an effort to improve their personal well-being and employment opportunities, allowing them to contribute positively to the communities in which they live.



## What types of programs/services do we offer?

### **Basic elementary education**

A foundation program in reading and speaking English, writing, and arithmetic for persons with no schooling or only primary grade training.

### **Advanced elementary education**

A program in advanced elementary education for those persons who have completed four to eight years of schooling and who desire to obtain more complete mastery of the fundamentals.

### **Secondary education**

A program of secondary education for those adults who, in youth, left school or for some reason had their education curtailed and who now desire to continue their education; for those youths who have been exempted from compulsory attendance under section 302A-1132; and for those youths who are in need of courses to complete their high school graduation requirements.

### **Adult literacy education**

A basic program in reading and writing English, and arithmetic for persons who need to develop or improve their mastery of basic literacy skills in these areas for purposes of enhancing their personal, social, or employment lives. This program also extends into the Hawaii hotel industry to assist foreign language speakers in their efforts to excel in the workplace.

### **Naturalization training**

The standard course of training provided by the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS), which shall be provided to all those persons who have filed applications for United States citizenship and desire to enroll in such a course under the supervision of the department.

## *Glossary of Terms*

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**Form 4140:** Exceptions to Compulsory Education

**Adult Basic Education (ABE):** Reading, math, writing and English instruction for adults functioning below the 9<sup>th</sup> grade level. Instruction is often contextualized around interest of the students and/or the high demand jobs in the area.

**Adult Secondary Education (ASE):** Adult high school and GED classes enable adults to acquire their secondary diploma or equivalent. Instruction can be integrated with occupational training leading to certification in a high demand job sector. Transition to postsecondary and/or employment is emphasized.

**CBHSDP:** Competency-Based High School Diploma Program

**English for Speakers of Other Languages:** New immigrants learn the English language and the culture of this country.

**English Literacy/Civics:** Instruction for new immigrants integrates English literacy and civics education services.

**ESL:** English as a Second Language

**GED:** General Educational Development

**Family Literacy:** Because the parent is the first teacher, family literacy programs enroll undereducated parents and their children and include individual sessions for the parents, individual sessions with the children and together time to assist the parents with their basic skills and the children with child development.

**Workplace Education:** Instruction is offered in an industrial plant to upgrade their employees reading, math and English in the context of work that enables employees to meet the requirements of ever increasing skill demands.



### **Cultural opportunities**

A program of adult and community education that will meet the interests and desires of those people who wish to enrich and to broaden their cultural, recreational, and social interests.

### **Support to the Department of Education**

A program consisting of substitute teacher certification/recertification, PRAXIS Prep for non-highly qualified teachers, post-secondary prep through college and career readiness, opportunities through credit recovery, and authorized GED Testing Centers.

### *What is the value of these programs/services?*

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- Assist adults seeking employment through integrated adult education and occupational training services
- Assist adults in helping their children with homework and to be successful in school
- Assist adults in leaving public assistance and achieving a family sustaining income
- Assist adults in learning the English language, understanding US culture, and participating in society
- Assist adults seeking a high school diploma or obtaining a GED
- Assist adults wishing to transfer to post secondary or other training and education programs

### *What is the impact of Adult Education Programs?*

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Adult education programs play a role in the success of many national initiatives, including job training, keeping our nation competitive, improving the academic achievement of our nation's children, providing alternatives for incarcerated individuals, improving the health of our nation's citizens, enabling new immigrants to learn English and prepare for citizenship, and helping individuals obtain the skills they require to obtain a job and end their dependency on federal programs. The RETURN ON INVESTMENT in adult education is significant.



## Hawaii Community Schools—By the Numbers

According to the US Census, American Community Survey, 990,953 adults reside in Hawaii. Of that number:

- 43,913 have 0 to 9 years of school
- 58,157 have 10 to 12 years of school but no diploma
- 10% (of all adults) are challenged to succeed and contribute
- 50,644 adults have limited English proficiency challenging their ability to succeed and contribute




