
Dear BOE members,

Dear Chairman Horner and Members of the Board of Education:

I am **OPPOSED** to any "Comprehensive Sexuality Education" (CSE) policy for Hawaii's schools and would urge you to do the same. The truth is none of the CSE programs evaluated by Health and Human Services (HHS) lower either pregnancy or STI rates.

In written testimony Superintendent of Education, Kathryn Matayoshi, states: "As there are existing policies and resources in place to address this area, the department respectfully suggests that this measure is not necessary at this time." She is referring to comprehensive sex education.

There is an attempt to get a policy change through the BOE since legislative efforts were stymied. Please do not succumb to sexualizing our keki. This "Comprehensive Sexuality Education" has not been vetted within the local community. Parents are standing here pleading with you to not allow these programs to be allowed into the lives of our innocent keki. Do not allow teaching children as young as 4-5 about masturbation, and that they have a right to choose their gender. Startling components of the "comprehensive" sex education programs for teens as young as 13 include lessons include:

Advocating showering together as a no risk activity.

Promoting methods for sexual stimulation.

Conducting sexual role-play on how to help a partner maintain an erection.

Describing how to eroticize condom use with a partner. Suggesting teens wear shades or a disguise when shopping for condoms so adults and parents won't recognize them.

How do these messages discourage casual sex, which we know can lead to pregnancy and STD's?

The underlying message is that if we only mandate comprehensive sex education that our problems with teen pregnancy rates and STD's will be over and yet, there is no evidence to support this claim. In fact the opposite is true as you can imagine by the content of these programs.

Advocates and proponents CSE are well funded and very good at messaging but the truth always has a way of showing itself. Recently the UN Population Fund (UNFPA) "mounted a full court press on African leaders to pressure them to change their positions on CSE for their countries. UNFPA had a \$1 billion dollar budget with which to pressure and influence delegates and yet Africa said no, calling it moral imperialism. Ugandan officials say that their abstinence programs won against the spread of AIDs, but condoms give a false sense of security.

The curricula are not based on health. Conversely, many of today's "comprehensive sex education" curricula mirror the 'FBI Molester Grooming Paradigm."

This is dangerous and sets children up to be used and exploited. This is not something we should be doing to the children of Hawaii. We should never allow any sex education program into the schools without first knowing that it is highly successful in accomplishing what those who support it say it does. This has not been done.

Please do not change the abstinence policy for Hawaii's sex education.

I spend hundreds of hours every year in the schools talking to students about consent, boundaries and healthy relationships. I believe that comprehensive sex education is a critical part of overall sexual health, which includes keeping our children safe from sexual abuse and empowering them to make healthy choices about respecting their own and other people's boundaries so as not to cross the line into sexual assault. 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

Aloha Members of the Board of Education,

I am Dileep G. Bal, M.D., and I have been a physician active in the full-time practice of medicine and public health for over four decades in senior positions in Arizona, California, and Hawaii. I wish to emphasize that the following statements are solely my personal views. The content, however, reflects the current state of the science and state of the practice nationwide.

I understand that the Hawaii State Board of Education is reviewing Policy 103.5, which requires reproductive health education to be a part of the school system's curriculum, and Policy 103.8, which bans condoms in public schools.

I wish to unequivocally support Policy 103.5 and strongly oppose Policy 103.8. That is my considered opinion based upon the recommendations of public health authorities nationwide.

I also understand that your Student Achievement Committee last week agreed with me on Policy 103.5 and deferred rendering judgment on Policy 103.8. I am gratified by their first action and puzzled by their second action, because the mere availability of contraceptives, especially condoms, results in a reduction of teenage pregnancy and sexually transmitted infection rates. That is a scientific and statistical fact.

I am concerned, and I must confess somewhat alarmed, that we are still debating this issue in the genesis of education policy in Hawaii, in the year of our Lord 2015. When I was Director of Health in Tucson, Arizona, in 1975, we debated this issue in a rather conservative state and came up with the only sensible solution. We collectively decided that we strongly discourage sexual activity among our school aged youth. However, in the event of our youth being sexually active (despite our collective disapproval for religious or other reasons), we would provide the necessary help from the public health and educational sectors to prevent teenage pregnancies and sexually transmitted infections. That is our job and we did it then and still do it now.

My main concern is that teenage pregnancies and sexually transmitted infections are regrettably common in our islands, compared to national rates. This epidemic requires that Hawaii's health and

education authorities collaborate on stemming this serious health concern for our youth. To do less, in my humble opinion, would be tantamount to medical and educational malpractice.

I have been given to understand that notwithstanding the DOE Guidelines (wishy-washy and vague as they are), some middle and high schools are neglecting to implement them, as they are not mandated. Therefore the DOE has in my opinion somehow put the burden of responsibility on the local complex superintendents and principals, thereby contributing to our current crisis. Furthermore, one major factor for this benign neglect is coercion by parents with certain religious leanings. Some educators have decided that discretion is the better part of valor, and so have elected to use avoidance as a coping mechanism. I do not fault them, but wish the DOE provided clearer direction. Moreover, many teachers in Hawaii are not even trained in the DOE-approved curricula, and therefore need clear direction and the requisite training.

As a lifelong Episcopalian and Lay Eucharist Minister at All Saints Episcopal Church in Kapaa for the last ten years, I am very sensitive to the cultural and religious nuances to this and other issues. However, I have an abhorrence for the insertion of personal bias into governmental educational policy, especially when it is contrary to accepted medical practice and results in an epidemic of unwanted pregnancies and sexually transmitted infections among our vulnerable youth. To knowingly injure our keiki, however unintentionally, is still very wrong at a fundamental and human level.

It is unconscionable for BOE members and others in a position of authority at the DOE to advance a policy that has universally been discredited by knowledgeable public health and education authorities. To reiterate, in my view this constitutes medical and educational malpractice, and in fact make you liable for lawsuits.

Finally, coming to the opt-in versus opt-out options, may I just say what is self-evident. Electing to go with the opt-in option is merely an obvious way of subverting such education from occurring.

If the Board of Education assures our population that every student in Hawaii will have unfettered access to appropriate instruction and medical assistance in these areas, we should soon see a plummeting of our teenage pregnancy and sexually transmitted infection rates. Thus, we will all have an objective and quantitative measure of our collaborative success. Absent availability of appropriate instruction and medical advice and care – i.e., the current situation – Hawaii will continue to have these outrageous teenage pregnancy and sexually transmitted infection rates.

My humble plea to the BOE is that they provide clear direction to the DOE consistent with national education and public health policy, so that every DOE complex is clear as to what they need to do, and then train the teachers to provide such education because it is now embedded as a requirement in their curriculum.

Mesdames et messieurs may I respectfully ask you, what don't we know and when didn't we know it?





I have worked with youth and families on Kaua`i for 39 years. Eleven of our sixteen schools are Title I, meaning 50 % or more students meet the federal income level for free and reduced lunch - they are poor. They are poorly educated as well and have little hope and more fear for their future. (Only 20% of youth entering Kaua`i Community College are prepared for college level courses.) If they only had a baby to love them.

If they only had a trusted, educated adult who could speak with them about reproductive health. I was in the fourth grade in Ms. Eck(!)'s class learning penmanship and reproductive health, among other lessons. I remember going home and asking my mother how you get a baby, incredulous at what I'd learned. She whirled around and queried "what do you want to know for?"! I, of course, needed to confirm that what I'd learned was in fact true.

Were I to be in the fourth grade today, there would be no question about any of this. The world is a different place than my naive questioning evokes. There is so much information and misinformation from the pundits; but the lives of our children are not steeped in that culture, they are in the youth culture. 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



Please do not succumb to sexualizing our keki. This "Comprehensive Sexuality Education" has not been vetted within the local community. 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

Uninsured Women in Hawaii

• In 2012, roughly 18,000 Medicare beneficiaries in Hawaii have saved an average of \$375 on prescription drugs as the new law has begun closing Medicare's prescription drug benefit.

More Benefits and Protections are on the way

- In 2014, the health insurance exchange will be up and running where women can shop and compare plans. Almost 12,000 women in Hawaii can access tax credits to help them purchase coverage through the exchange.
- Access to coverage through Medicaid: States have the option to extend Medicaid coverage to individuals earning less than about \$15,000 a year, and families earning less than about \$30,000 a year (133% of federal poverty line). The federal government will cover 100% of the cost of this eligibility expansion in the first three years, phasing down to 90% in subsequent years.
- 14,000 women in Hawaii will be newly covered because Hawaii has accepted federal money to expand Medicaid eligibility.
- When combined with other reforms in the ACA, this coverage expansion would reduce uninsured in Hawaii by nearly 50%.
- Accepting federal money and covering more people could save Hawaii \$101 million in uncompensated care costs over the next ten years.
- Covering more people through Medicaid will bring in almost 2.7 billion of federal funding into Hawaii helping to keep hospitals open and available in local communities.

Services Hawaii Women Need

- Starting in 2014 plans can no longer deny coverage to adults with pre-existing conditions.
 This means women will no longer be treated as a pre-existing condition and be denied
 insurance coverage for a history of pregnancy; having had a C-section; being a survivor
 of breast, or cervical cancer; or having received medical treatment for domestic or sexual
 violence.
- Starting no later than 2014, insurance companies will no longer be allowed to charge women and small employers with a predominantly-female workforce more for coverage, a practice known as gender-rating. In Hawaii, all plans practice gender rating and all plans also charge non-smoking women more for coverage than male smokers.

Education about our bodies has not been proven to increase the rates of teen sex.

As a health care provider in the Koolauloa district I can attest to the vast deficit of knowledge within our population about their reproductive organs, sexually transmitted infections and disease and pregnancy. This had led to major life consequences, some of which our community carries for life. We have the highest incidence of chlamydia in the state with an approximately 14% rate, which is well above the national and state average. This is not something to be proud of. This is due directly to our schools denying our children education about the above topics, and instead focusing on abstinence. In a state where teen pregnancy is looked upon positively and welcomed culturally instead of seen as a terrible thing, we need to educate our children so they can protect themselves for STI/STDs as well as make their own decisions about birth control. We do not have the right to perpetuate pregnancy in our teens due our desire to keep them in the dark. Please be respectful of our children and help them attain the education

they need by voting in favor of policy 103.5.







Currently, Hawaii's teens rank lowest in the nation for any type of birth control to prevent pregnancy during intercourse. Hawaii's teen pregnancy rate is 9th highest in the country. The American Congress of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG), Hawaii Section strongly supports the inclusion of comprehensive, medically accurate, age appropriate sexuality education as an integral part of health education in schools. Sexuality education should encourage young people to delay becoming sexually active and, if sexually active, to use contraception and barrier protection to prevent unintended pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections. These two goals are essential in all sexuality education programs.

Many parents talk with their adolescent children about risks and responsibilities of sexual activity, but one-third to one-half of all females aged 15-19 years report never having talked with a parent about birth

control, sexually transmitted infections, or how to say no to sex (Martinez, Educating teenagers about sex in the United States. NCHS Data Brief No. 44, 2010). Approximately 56% of teens aged 12-19 years wish they were getting more information about abstinence and birth control or protection (National campaign to prevent teen pregnancy. America's adults and teens sound off about teen pregnancy. Washington DC: NCPTP; 2007).

Parents and other adults overwhelmingly support school programs that teach both abstinence and other methods of preventing pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections.

Nationwide, the content of school-based education varies widely. Most well-designed studies of abstinence-only education have shown no effect on teen sexual behavior. But many comprehensive programs that support both abstinence and use of condoms and contraceptives have delayed initiation of sex, decreased the number of sexual partners, and increased condom or contraceptive use.

In Hawaii, lack of comprehensive sexual health education has resulted in poor health outcomes for Hawaii youth. Hawaii's teens rank lowest in the nation for condom use and for use of any type of birth control to prevent pregnancy during intercourse. Hawaii's teen pregnancy rate is 9th highest in the country, and the cost to Hawaii taxpayers is about \$32 million per year. (Family Planning Division, Department of Obstetrics, Gynecology and Women's Health, University of Hawaii – JABSOM)

Hawaii ACOG strongly supports efforts to implement effective comprehensive sexuality education for adolescents, including the following:

- 1. Parental involvement in children's sexuality education.
- 2. Scientifically accurate information about sexuality, sexually transmitted infections, contraception and preventive health care.
- 3. Encouragement of abstinence from sexual intercourse as a healthy choice for adolescents, particularly young adolescents.
- 4. Efforts to increase effective use of contraceptives, including latex condoms and dual use of condoms with other effective contraceptive methods, by sexually active adolescents.

5. Ongoing rigorous evaluation of the effectiveness of a variety of forms of sexuality education in terms of their effects on sexual behavior and contraceptive use, as well as unintended pregnancy and abortion rates.

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

How do these messages discourage casual sex which we know can lead to pregnancy and STD's?

The underlying message is that if we only mandate comprehensive sex education that our

problems with teen pregnancy rates and STD's will be over. There is no evidence to support this claim. In fact the opposite is true as you can imagine by the content of these programs.

Advocates and proponents of CSE, such as Planned Parenthood and others, are well funded and very good at messaging but the truth always has a way of showing itself. Recently the UN Population Fund (UNFPA) "mounted a full court press on African leaders to pressure them to change their positions on CSE for their countries. UNFPA had a \$1 billion dollar budget with which to pressure and influence delegates and yet Africa said no, calling it moral imperialism. Ugandan officials say that their abstinence programs won against the spread of AIDs, but condoms give a false sense of security. We agree with Africa, abstinence is always the best choice.

We should never allow any sex education program into the schools without first knowing that it is highly successful in accomplishing what those who support it say it does. This has not been done.

Please do not change the abstinence policy for Hawaii's sex education.

I am writing to provide my testimony for the upcoming meeting on April 21, 2015 at $1:30\,\mathrm{pm}$ at 1390 Miller St, Rm 404, with regard to sex education policy changes.

I am a concerned citizen and parent and secondary school teacher, resident of Hawaii for 15 years, with a 16 year old son and older daughter, both of whom have been schooled for many years in Hawaii. I have heard that the BOE is considering changing to a "comprehensive" sex education curriculum, and also changing back to an "opt out" policy for sex education. I am strongly opposed to both of these changes.

I do not want my children or any children exposed to detailed, explicit, and inappropriate information about sexual activities, such as is contained in "comprehensive" sex education. Such information carrying the endorsement of the schools, teachers, and government will inevitably lead children to think that it is ok to engage in such activities, and I hope we all agree that the leading and the activities are both not ok. Parents should be the ones to teach children about this, within the family structure. I do not trust any government entity to deal with this properly, no matter what their intentions might be. I have examined the so-called "Pono Choices" curriculum, and it has a substantial amount of objectionable and inappropriate material in it.

Sex education, even non-objectionable sex education, should be completely within the purview of parents; parents must have their authority respected for this. In order for this respect to be implemented in a serious way, parents must be able to say yes or no to their child's participation. This can only occur with an "opt-in" procedure. Thank you for the opportunity to express my opinion concerning the proposed changes to the sex education policy.

I do not support the changes cited in B.O.E. Policy 103.5 Exhibit A or C.

The suggested policy amendments state:

In order to help students make decisions that promote healthy behaviors, the Department of Education shall provide sexual health education to include age appropriate, medically accurate, health education that: (1) Includes education on abstinence, contraception, and methods of disease prevention to prevent unintended pregnancy and sexually transmitted disease, including human immunodeficiency virus; (2) Helps students develop relationships and communication skills to form healthy relationships that are based on mutual respect and affection and are free from violence, coercion and intimidation; (3) Helps students develop skills in critical thinking, problem solving, decision making and stress management to make healthy decisions about sexuality and relationships; (4) Encourages student to communicate with their parents, guardians and other trusted adults about sexuality; and (5) informs students of available community resources.

"A student shall be excused from sexual health instruction only upon the prior written request of the student's parent or legal guardian. A student may not be subject to disciplinary action, academic penalty or other sanction if the student's parent or legal guardian makes such written request."

Points 3 - 5 have moved beyond the simple facts of sex education which Exhibit B provides, including pregnancy and disease prevention, to moral and ethical issues which should be taught by parents.

Who is to decide what "healthy decisions about sexuality and relationships" are? There are differing social, cultural and religious views concerning sexuality. Who decides whose preferences and beliefs are going to be taught? Critical thinking and decision making concerning sexuality are not basic biological facts, such as pregnancy and disease prevention, and should not be taught to all students as if they are. These are value laden subjects. Whose values will be taught and upon what basis will the decisions be made?

Point 4 sounds good on the outset, but then encourages children to communicate with "other trusted adults about sexuality". What gives the B.O.E. and educators the right to encourage children to speak to "other adults" about such sensitive issues as sexuality? What if the parents do not agree with these "other trusted adults?" How are the teachers to know? This is not the job of educators, and they may be usurping parents' values and morals.

Point 5 "informs students of available community resources." What kind of resources? Help regarding sexuality issues? Disease medications? Pregnancy counseling or abortions? All of these subjects should NEVER be presented to children without parental consent. Sadly, I do not believe most parents are aware that their children will be counseled concerning such potential life altering issues without their knowledge or approval.

Lastly, who decides when "age appropriate" is for sexual information? The idea that children as young as 5 or 6 should begin to be exposed to sexual information is ludicrous. And even for older children, simply because a child turns a certain age doesn't mean that they are emotionally prepared for sex ed. A "one size fits all" model is not in the child's best interest. Parents are the foremost judges as to whether the class would be age appropriate for their child.

I do not understand why you are attempting to change the sexual education programs from "opt-in" to "opt-out". It wasn't very long ago that the legislature decided that it was in the best interest of Hawaii's keiki and parents to "opt in". What has changed?

The best way to ensure each child is cared for to their specific needs and each family's values are honored is to continue the "opt-in" method. If the curriculum is easily accessible, which should not be a problem with today's technology, and a parent is encouraged to look it over before signing a waiver to allow their child to participate (opt-in), then the greatest goals would be met. More people would be accessing the information, encouraging greater parental involvement in making the best decisions in regards to their children's specific educational needs. What could be better for our keiki and our educational system than greater partnerships between schools and families?





The Commission supports sexual health education and opposes the condom ban. Please improve the health, safety and future of our youth by voting in favor of proposed policy 103.5.

Hawaii's youth have one of the lowest rates of condom use in the nation. Additionally, our youth experience high teen pregnancy rates and sexually transmitted infection (STI) rates. The 2013 Hawaii Youth Risk Behavior Survey, compiled in conjunction with the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and the DOE, found that 36% of teens in high school were having sex, 25% of those teens had multiple partners in the three months prior to the survey, and 54% of those teens did not use a condom. Even more startling, 18% reported never learning about AIDS or HIV infection in school. Finally, 24% used drugs or alcohol before their last sexual encounter. The CDC states that the solutions to these shocking realities are better health education, more comprehensive health services, more supportive policies, and more family involvement. The Commission supports policy 103.5 and respectfully requests that you support 103.5

I have worked with youth for over 15 years. As a former health educator, I witnessed the detrimental effects of little to no comprehensive health information being provided to students. Students deserve to have medically and scientifically accurate information provided to them, so that they can make the best decisions for themselves. Withholding crucial information on basic anatomy and physiology provides a great disservice to our young students. The Commission urges the Board of Education to support proposed policy 103.5. 



A student shall be excused from any part of the instruction provided pursuant to this section only upon the written request of the student's parent or legal guardian

I do not believe this legislation has merit to even allow it into our curriculum and the opt out option should not be used, the **opt-in option** should be exercised, if this legislation moves forward. Preference is that this curriculum should not move forward.

6 Perspective:

As a consultant and a leader in the community, I believe in giving back to the community, so I sit on the Board of Directors of certain non-profit organizations in the State.

One of which is Mililani Middle School of which I am honored to be the Vice President of the Board of Directors for the Parent Teacher Student Organization. For this write-up, there has not been time to present this write up to the board, so I present this as a concerned parent as a consultant to state government.

As VP of the PTSO I spend significant time at the school and with parents in the execution of my duties of the Board. Mililani Middle School is the largest middle school in Hawaii, approx 1740 students and I have a student at the school. Ms. Chung our Principal is an excellent Executive, a true leader which manages the affairs of the school with integrity. I have dialogued with our State Senator, Ms. Kidani and State Representative Ms. Fukumoto Chang and they are very supportive of our school and our community.

What would be more appropriate from the legislature and what the parents are asking for, is **increased academic proficiency curriculum i**n the schools, not sex education. Many parents think the DOE is pre-occupied with sex, the students and the parents are not.

Sex education is not required in the public school system in Hawaii. I have seen in discussion with various groups that the consensus is that the DOE appears to be pre-occupied with Sex, which may be monetary motivated from within and without.. General Business Meeting April 21, 2015

The Student Achievement Committee ("Committee") met on April 7, 2015 and took action on Board Policy 103.5, Sexual Health Education ("Policy 103.5"), recommending that the Board approve the policy as is, attached as **Exhibit A**. Policy 103.5 is designed to replace Board Policy 2110, Abstinence-Based Education attached as **Exhibit B**. A redline showing the differences between Policy 103.5 and Policy 2110 is attached as **Exhibit C**.

POLICY 103.5

SEXUAL HEALTH EDUCATION

In order to help students make decisions that promote healthy behaviors, the Department of Education shall provide sexual health education to include age appropriate, medically accurate, health education that: (1) Includes education on abstinence, contraception, and methods of disease prevention to prevent unintended pregnancy and sexually transmitted disease, including human immunodeficiency virus; (2) Helps students develop relationships and communication skills to form healthy relationships that are based on mutual respect and affection and are free from violence, coercion and intimidation; (3) Helps students develop skills in critical thinking, problem solving, decision making and stress management to make healthy decisions about sexuality and relationships; (4) Encourages student to communicate with their parents, guardians and other trusted adults about sexuality; and (5) Informs students of available community resources. Instruction will emphasize that abstention from sexual intercourse is the surest way to prevent unintended pregnancies, sexually transmitted diseases such as HIV/AIDS, and consequent emotional distress.

A student shall be excused from sexual health instruction only upon the prior written request of the student's parent or legal guardian. A student may not be subject to disciplinary action, academic penalty or other sanction if the student's parent or legal guardian makes such written request.

Aloha and mahalo nui for allowing me to testify in **STRONG SUPPORT** of Policy 103.5.

I am a Social Worker, a former foster parent, and a Christian. I have worked with youth and families for over 20 years and I am a strong believer that knowledge is power. While I agree that it is important for youth to receive the message that abstinence is the best way to avoid unplanned pregnancy and to avoid contracting STDs, I am just as convinced that if we do not provide them with **COMPREHENSIVE** sexual health education, they are at much higher risk for both.

You see, if you want to teach kids about math, you don't just teach addition and not teach subtraction, multiplication, or division. If you want to teach them about language arts, you don't just teach about nouns and not teach about verbs, pronouns, and adjectives. 
I also think it is imperative that sexual health education classes be opt-out. As you might imagine, not all parents are as involved as we might like them to be in the lives of their children. As long as sexual health education remains opt-in, there will always be a large number of children who do not receive this education because their parents were unaware and did not opt-in their children. There are also many parents, especially here in Hawaii, for whom English is a second language and who may not know they are required to opt their children into sexual health education. Some of them may not even be able to read or understand the opt-in form. Don't these children deserve the opportunity to receive sexual health education? And sadly, there are also a handful of children experience sexual abuse in their homes. Do you honestly think the parents of those children are going to opt their children in to receive sexual health education, where they may be taught that sexual abuse is not normal and not OK???

Those parents who do not want their children to receive comprehensive sexual health education have the option of opting their children out of sexual health education and educating them at home or elsewhere. But in my opinion, it makes much more sense for this small handful of parents to opt their children out of this important education than to ask the large majority to opt their children in. 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

Subject Comprehensive Sexuality Education

Last Tuesday, we met with the Board of Education to testify about Planned Parenthood's desire to have Comprehensive Sexuality (Abnormal Sexual) Education in Public Schools. Hyper Sexualizing children does them no favors, it does not create academic success or individual success, The child begins to desire to satisfy his needs and urges immediately. As in other parts of the US, once CSE is in, it become stronger in its education, children/teachers become desensitized and what was once thought as being to offensive for younger grades, is now acceptable. This is the case in Oregon, Detroit, Washington, to name a few.

Please be careful as you read the proposal. It is written like every other state that has passed CSE. Written to sound healthy, medically accurate and age appropriate BUT it does not reflect this after it has been approved. I have overwhelming amount of news reports and information of parents and other BOEs that have stopped CSE from continuing. All written by Planned Parenthood, Advocates for Youth and SEICUS.

Here is SEICUS' definition of CSE. Reminder all this is still taught under CSE just shifted around if not allowed at lower grades.

Level 1 (Ages 5 to 8):

• Both girls and boys have body parts that feel good when touched.

- Vaginal intercourse occurs when a man and a woman place the penis inside the vagina.
- Human beings experience different kinds of loving.
- Most men and women are heterosexual, which means they will be attracted to and fall in love with someone of the other gender.
- Some men and women are homosexual, which means they will be attracted to and fall in love with someone of the same gender.
- Homosexuals are also known as gay men and lesbian women.
- Many people live in lifetime committed relationships, even though they may not be legally married.
- Touching and rubbing one's own genitals to feel good is called masturbation.
- Some boys and girls masturbate and others do not.
- Masturbation should be done in a private place.
- Adults often kiss, hug, touch and engage in other sexual behavior with one another to show caring and to share sexual pleasure.

Level 2 (Ages 9 to 12):

- Sexual intercourse provides pleasure.
- Sexual orientation refers to whether a person is heterosexual, homosexual, or bisexual.
- A bisexual person is attracted to both men and women.
- Why a person has a particular sexual orientation is not now known.
- Homosexual, heterosexual, and bisexual people are alike except for their sexual attraction.
- Homosexual and bisexual people are often mistreated, called hurtful names, or denied their rights because of their sexual orientation.
- Some people are afraid to admit they are bisexual or homosexual because they fear they will be mistreated.
- Homosexual love relationships can be as fulfilling as heterosexual relationships.
- Gay men and lesbians can adopt children or have their own children.
- Masturbation is often the first way a person experiences sexual pleasure.
- Many boys and girls begin to masturbate for sexual pleasure during puberty.
- Couples have different ways to share sexual pleasure with each other.
- Being sexual with another person usually involves more than sexual intercourse.
- A woman faced with an unintended pregnancy can carry the pregnancy to term and raise the baby, place the baby for adoption, or have an abortion to end the pregnancy.
- Abortion is legal in the United States.
- Abortion must be performed by a physician or other licensed health provider.
- A legal abortion is very safe.

Level 3 (Ages 12 to 15):

• Theories about what determines sexual orientation include genetics and prenatal influences, socio-cultural influence, psychosocial factors, and a

- combination of all these factors.
- Homosexual couples behave sexually in many of the same ways as heterosexual couples.
- Many young people have brief sexual experiences (including fantasies and dreams) with the same gender, but they mainly feel attracted to the other gender.
- Some young people have brief sexual experiences (including fantasies and dreams) with the other gender but they mainly feel attracted to their own gender.
- When a homosexual person accepts his/her sexual orientation, gains strength and pride as a gay or lesbian person, and tells others, it is known as "coming out."
- Talking about feelings about sexual orientation can be difficult.
- "Coming out" can be difficult because people fear negative reactions.
- Some people feel attracted to both men and women.
- Every culture and society has some people who are homosexual.
- People do not choose their sexual orientation. -[WRONG!]
- Sexual orientation cannot be changed by therapy or medicine.
- Understanding one's sexual orientation can be difficult.
- Gay men, lesbian women, and bisexuals can lead fulfilling lives.
- Gay men and lesbian women can establish lifelong committed relationships.
- Some religious groups oppose homosexuality.
- Peoples' beliefs about homosexuality are based on their religious, cultural, and family values.
- When couples spend a lot of time together alone, they are more likely to become sexually involved.
- Gay and lesbian youth, like heterosexual youth, may or may not date.
- Two people who cohabit can have the same commitment and responsibility toward one another as married people.
- Sometimes the values one learns in society conflict with the values one has learned in one's family. [Here's the setup to undermine parental imparting of values]
- Values should be freely chosen after the alternatives and their consequences are evaluated. [Here's the punch! "We're right, your parents are wrong!"]
- Teenagers sometimes need to talk with an adult other than their parents. [**AGAIN!**]
- Some agencies provide services for teenagers that <u>do not require parental</u> <u>permission</u>, are confidential, and cost little or no money. [And AGAIN!]
- How often a person masturbates varies for every individual.
- A person worried about masturbation might talk to a trusted adult.
- Most people have masturbated at some time in their lives.
- Masturbation, either alone or with a partner, is one way a person can enjoy and express their sexuality without risking pregnancy or an STD/HIV.
- Many negative myths exist about masturbation.
- When two people express their sexual feelings together, they usually give and

- receive pleasure.
- Sexual relationships can be more fulfilling in a loving relationship.
- Being sexual with another person usually involves different sexual behaviors.
- Some sexual expressions are prohibited by law and disapproved of by certain religions and families.
- An early abortion can be done in a clinic, doctor's office, or hospital.
- Most women report no problems after having an abortion.
- People's beliefs about abortion are based on their religious, cultural, and family values.
- Some religions support the right to an abortion.
- Some religions oppose abortion.
- The right of a woman to have a legal abortion is guaranteed by the Supreme Court, although there are restrictions in some states.

Level 4 (Ages 15 to 18):

- Sexual orientation is determined by a combination of a person's attractions, fantasies, and behavior.
- Gender identity is determined by a person's feelings of maleness or femaleness.
- The understanding and identification of one's sexual orientation may change during life.
- Some people who engage in same gender sexual behavior do not identify as bisexual, gay, or lesbian.
- Teenagers who have questions about their sexual or gender orientation should consult a trusted and knowledgeable adult.
- People of different generations may have different values and ideas about family life.
- Dating can be a way to learn about other people, about romantic and sexual feelings and expression, and about what it is like to be in a loving relationship.
- Having values different from one's family can be difficult. [Here's the setup to undermine parental values!]
- A person may accept one's family's values and not always agree with all of them. [And here's the follow-through: "ignore your parents' values, assume ours."]
- To behave according to one's values can be difficult but usually results in feelings of pride.
- The traditional gender roles about sexuality in our society are becoming more flexible.
- For most people, sharing a sexual experience with a partner is a satisfying way to express sexuality.
- Couples and individuals need to decide how to express their sexual feelings.
- Some sexual behaviors shared by partners include kissing, touching, talking, caressing, massaging, sharing erotic literature or art, bathing/showering together, and oral, vaginal or anal intercourse.
- Individuals are responsible for their own sexual pleasure.

- Some people use erotic photographs, movies, or literature to enhance their sexual fantasies when alone or with a partner. [Use pornography, it's great!
- Some sexual fantasies involve mysterious or forbidden things.
- Many people's sexual fantasies include behaviors not actually acted upon or even desired in real life.
- Some people continue to respect their religious teachings and traditions but believe that some views are not personally relevant. [In other words, throw out what the Bible says, because we're telling you it's not relevant!]
- There are a growing number of congregations that welcome openly gay men and lesbians. ["If your church isn't one of them, find a new one."]

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
