SUBJECT: Update on the Department of Education's Supplemental Budget Request for 2016-2017 Fiscal Year: House Committee on Finance Decisions

1. DESCRIPTION

Update on the House Draft of House Bill (HB) 1700 House Draft (HD) 1, the Supplemental Budget Bill, which makes amendments primarily to the second year (next fiscal year) of the two year Fiscal Biennium Budget currently in place.

2. UPDATE OR PRESENTATION

- a. January 7, 2016, the Department made a presentation on the Executive Supplemental Request to a joint hearing of the House Committee on Finance (FIN) and Senate Ways and Means Committee (WAM).

- b. January 25, 2016, HB1700 was referred to FIN.
- c. March 9, 2016, FIN held a hearing on HB1700, after which a high level summary of amendments to be contained in the HD1 was announced and decision making followed.

- d. On the afternoon of March 14, 2016, HB1700 HD1 was decked (filed with the House Clerk's Office) to be placed on the calendar for Third Reading. The

Committee Report did not contain the traditional level of detail explaining the changes made to the Governor's Executive Supplemental Request (HB1700). It was noted that the general funds budget was \$84.2 million lower than what had been requested.

HOUSE FINANCE COMMITTEE PASSES CONSERVATIVE SUPPLEMENTAL BUDGET

The House Finance Committee today passed out a proposed supplemental budget that continues a fiscal conservative framework focused on increasing transparency in the budget process and enabling the state to spend more efficiently.

HB1700 appropriates an additional \$1.19 billion for operating and capital improvement costs of the Executive Branch for FY2017, bringing the budget total to \$7.08 billion for the second year of the biennium. There were no changes for FY2016 in the supplemental budget.

The bill includes funds for Transient Oriented Development, sexual abuse victims services, and the transfer of the Maui Health Systems to Kaiser Foundation Hospital. The proposed budget also includes monies from general obligation bonds and all other means of financing for capital improvement projects (CIP), including:

\$675,317,000 in general obligation bonds for FY2016 \$1,172,952,000 in general obligation bonds for FY2017 \$1,642,156,000 in all means of financing funds for FY2016 \$2,834,919,000 in all means of financing funds for FY2017

"We started several years ago to look for ways to make state government more efficient and to create a mindset for the state to spend within its means as a matter of consistent practice," said Representative Sylvia Luke (Makiki, Punchbowl, Nuuanu, Dowsett Highlands, Pacific Heights, Pauoa), House Finance Chair.

"One of the primary ways to achieve this end was for us to get a more accurate accounting of what the needs of our departments were, especially when it came to manpower. What we found were issues relating to hard-to-fill vacancies and vacation payouts for retirees clouding a clear picture of what those needs were.

"In the case of longstanding vacancies of two years or more, we are asking the departments to reassess the positions to see why they are so hard to fill. If we need to be more competitive with the private sector to attract quality employees, then we need to consider that," Luke said.

Luke also said that, in the past, departments have assumed the cost of vacation compensations for retirees as part of their operating budget, which further clouded the true cost of operations.

"So we've asked the departments to be more forthcoming in identifying those costs so that we can account for them. Since implementing this new 'truth in budgeting' policy, I believe we have made the process more transparent and, in the long run, will lead to making state government more efficient," Luke said.

The budget bill goes to the full House next week for its consideration.

begs leave to report as follows:

The purpose of this measure is to appropriate supplemental funds for the operating and capital improvement costs for the Executive Branch for fiscal year (FY) July 1, 2016, through June 30, 2017.

HB1700 HD1: PROVISO Amendment

SECTION 7. Part VII, Act 119, Session Laws of Hawaii 2015, is amended: (1) By repealing section 127:

"[SECTION 127. Provided that the director of finance shall ensure that non-facility per pupil general fund amounts allocated for department of education and charter school students are equal on an annualized fiscal year basis; provided further that, for the purposes of this section, all general fund appropriations for school-based budgeting (EDN100), instructional support (EDN200), state administration (EDN300), and school support (EDN400) shall be considered non-facility appropriations for department of education students; provided further that, for the purposes of this section, the general fund appropriation for charter schools (EDN600) shall be considered the non-facility appropriation for charter school students; provided further that, for the purposes of this section, all grant appropriations issued pursuant to chapter 42F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and funds appropriated for teacher recruitment and retention incentive for hard to fill positions shall be excluded from non-facility appropriations for the department of education and charter schools; and provided further that, notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, for fiscal year 2015-2016 and fiscal year 2016-2017, the director of finance shall:

(1)-Determine the sum of general fund appropriations made for the department of education and charter school student non-facility costs;

(2) Determine the sum of department of education and charter school student enrollment based upon verified actual student enrollment counts as of October 15; (3) Determine a per pupil amount by dividing the sum of general fund appropriations determined under paragraph (1) by the sum of student enrollment determined under paragraph (2);

(4)-Transfer a general fund amount between the department of education and charter schools prior to November 1, 2015, and November 1, 2016, respectively, that will provide each with a per pupil allocation equal to the amount determined on an annualized fiscal year basis under paragraph (3); and

(5) Account for all calculations and transfers made pursuant to this section in a report to the legislature, governor, department of education, and charter schools within ten days of any transfer made pursuant to this section.]"

COMMENT: Deletion of proviso that provides further guidance of the execution of the charter school "true-up" that otherwise would be executed per Hawaii Revised Statutes §302D-28. Proviso clarified that for the "true-up" any grant in aid appropriations and DOE's Hard-to-Staff costs should be excluded, and that the DOE would be responsible for the Charter Schools' Hard-to-Staff costs.
