General Business Meeting

May 3, 2016

Pursuant to Hawaii Revised Statutes ("HRS") Section 302D-3(c),¹ entitled "[s]tate public charter school commission establishment; appointment," the Board of Education ("Board") appoints the members of the State Public Charter School Commission ("Commission"). The section further states that the Board shall "consider the combination of abilities, breadth of experiences, and characteristics of the commission, including but not limited to reflecting the diversity of the student population, geographical representation, and a broad representation of education-related stakeholders." Section 302D-3(d), HRS, further requires each nominee to the Commission to meet minimum qualifications. These minimum qualifications are:

1. Commitment to education. Each nominee's record should demonstrate a deep and abiding interest in education, and a dedication to the social, academic, and character development of young people through the administration of a high performing charter school system;
2. Record of integrity, civic virtue, and high ethical standards. Each nominee shall demonstrate integrity, civic virtue, and high ethical standards and be willing to hold fellow commission members to the same;
3. Availability for constructive engagement. Each nominee shall commit to being a conscientious and attentive commission member; and
4. Knowledge of best practices. Each nominee shall have an understanding of best practices in charter school educational governance or shall be willing to be trained in such.

Section 302D-3(e), HRS, provides that nominees shall also ideally meet the following recommended qualifications:

1. Experience governing complex organizations. Each nominee should possess experience with complex organizations, including but not limited to performance contract management, and a proven ability to function productively within them; and

¹ Section 302D-3(c), HRS, provides:

"The commission shall consist of nine members to be appointed by the board. The board shall appoint members who will be tasked with authorizing public charter schools that serve the unique and diverse needs of public school students. The chair of the commission shall be designated by the members of the commission for each school year beginning July 1, and whenever there is a vacancy. The board shall consider the combination of abilities, breadth of experiences, and characteristics of the commission, including but not limited to reflecting the diversity of the student population, geographical representation, and a broad representation of education-related stakeholders. The commission shall be exempt from sections 26-34 and 26-36."

2. Collaborative leadership ability. Each nominee should have substantial leadership experience that ideally illustrates the nominee's ability to function among diverse colleagues as an effective team member, with the ability to articulate, understand, and help shape consensus surrounding commission policies.

At its April 19, 2016 general business meeting, the Board nominated H. Mitchell D'Olier, Sylvia M. Hussey, Nolan N. Kawano, John S. S. Kim, and G. Kalehua S. Krug for appointment to the Commission. Of these five nominees, the Board may appoint up to four to fill the following current or upcoming vacancies of the Commission:

1. Remainder of the term expiring June 30, 2017 for the vacancy left by the resignation of Peter Tomozawa;
2. Remainder of the term expiring June 30, 2016 for the vacancy left by the resignation of Peter Hanohano and a subsequent three-year term ending June 30, 2019;
3. Upon the expiration of the current term of Commissioner H. Mitchell D'Olier on June 30, 2016, a three-year term effective July 1, 2016 and ending June 30, 2019; and
4. Upon the expiration of the current term of Commissioner G. Kalehua S. Krug on June 30, 2016, a three-year term effective July 1, 2016 and ending June 30, 2019.

H. MITCHELL D'OLIER CHAIR

H. Mitchell “Mitch” D'Olier was elected chair of Kaneohe Ranch Company, Limited and the Harold K.L. Castle Foundation effective January 1, 2014. He was previously president and chief executive officer of Kaneohe Ranch and the Foundation from July 2002 to December 31, 2013, and previously president and chief executive officer of Victoria Ward, Limited from 1993 to 2002. D'Olier was president and chief operating officer of Hawaiian Airlines, Inc. and its related companies from August 1991 through May 1993. Prior to joining Hawaiian, he was a partner and management committee member of the Honolulu law firm of Goodsill, Anderson, Quinn & Stifel, which he joined as an associate in February 1972.

Kaneohe Ranch manages the real estate owned by Limited Liability Companies for the family of Harold K.L. Castle and Alice H. Castle. The real estate portfolio consists of land holdings located on the windward side of Oahu, and on the mainland United States.

The Foundation is the largest private foundation based in Hawaii. Grants are primarily awarded to non-profit organizations focusing on public education leadership, and closing achievement and preparation gaps, nearshore marine resource conservation, and strengthening Windward Oahu communities. Since its inception, the Harold K.L. Castle Foundation has awarded more than \$176 million in grants. The Foundation currently averages grant awards of \$7.0 million a year. This amount will increase as a result of a real estate transaction that closed in December 2013.

D'Olier is a founding member and executive committee member of Malama Maunalua, a community-based stewardship initiative to restore Maunalua Bay on the southeast side of Oahu. He is also the Hawaii Regional Chair of Teach For America, a national organization focused on eliminating educational inequity by enlisting the country's most promising future leaders. D'Olier is a director of Kaneohe Ranch Management Limited and the Harold K.L. Castle Foundation; a member of the Iowa Law School Foundation Board of Directors; a member of the State of Hawaii Public Charter School Commission; a member and past president of the Rotary Club of Honolulu; a member of the Board of Advisors and past president of the Boys & Girls Club of Hawaii; and a member of the advisory board of Sea Grant in the School of Ocean Earth Science & Technology at the University of Hawaii.

D'Olier and his wife, Bambi, moved to Hawaii from Iowa in 1972. They have three sons and three granddaughters


