The Space Shuttle Challenger

Date of Explosion: January 28, 1986



The Challenger was on its 10th launch at the Kennedy Space Center at Cape Canaveral, Florida.

The explosion happened **73 seconds** after the launch.

Due to: O-Ring failure that led to engine malfunctions. The explosion destroyed the shuttle and launched the pieces everywhere. All seven crew members were

pronounced dead, including the Hawaii born Ellison Onizuka.



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The Initial Condition














What needed to be fixed?

- Cockpit Furnishing: Redoing Seats, Dashboard, Flooring. Equipping the front with electronics, and lighting.


