Superintendent's Annual Report

"Overcoming Challenges," the Superintendent's 2010 Annual Report, outlines the Department's progress as it embarks on an ambitious transformation of the statewide public school system.



This 21st annual report highlights obstacles that have already been cleared, as well as some that may lie ahead. It also provides demographic, financial and performance data that can be used for analysis within the system and for comparison with similar public school systems in other states. "At-a-Glance" highlights include:

2010 Superintendent's 21ST ANNUAL REPORT

• Enrollment Trends. Public school enrollment grew by almost 800 students from 2008-09 to 2009-10, while private school enrollment stalled for the first time in five years. In 2009-10, public school enrollment was 178,649, representing approximately 84 percent of students across the state.

• Educators. Overall teacher quality and staffing stability showed signs of improvement in 2010: 93 percent of teachers were fully licensed, 32 percent had earned advanced degrees and 58 percent had been at the same school for five or more years.

• Hawaii State Assessment. Since implementing the Hawaii Content and Performance Standards III in 2007, student proficiency has improved each year. Between 2007 and 2010, reading proficiency increased from 60 percent to 67 percent, while math proficiency rose from 38 percent to 49 percent.

• No Child Left Behind. For the first time since the Annual Measurable Objectives were increased in 2008, the majority of schools (51 percent) met Adequate Yearly Progress. However, the percentage of schools sanctioned under NCLB increased from 52 percent to 56 percent. The percentage of schools meeting Adequate Yearly Progress decreased from 65 percent in 2007 to 51 percent in 2010.

• Safety & Well-Being. Schools must implement Wellness Guidelines by the end of school year 2010-11. In school year 2009-10, 224 schools (89 percent) participated in the Safety and Wellness Survey. Of those, 163 schools (73 percent) already have a Wellness Committee.

Hawaii's Top Vice Principal

Maui Waena Intermediate vice principal Jacquelyn Davis has been selected as Hawaii's 2011 State Assistant Principal of the Year. Davis is one of 52 vice principals nationwide being honored by the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

Jamie Yap, principal of Maui Waena Intermediate, credited Davis with

changing the culture of the school and improving its academic achievement. Yap noted, "Ms. Davis is an asset to the school because of her ability to communicate effectively with the school community. Her support of students, families, and staff is her commitment to excellence."

Davis earned a bachelor's degree in special education from the University of Nevada and a master's degree in administration and supervision from the University of Phoenix. An 18-year veteran of education systems in Las Vegas and Maui, her career with the Hawaii State Department of Education began in 2001 when she was appointed as a vice principal at Lahaina Intermediate. For the last five years, Davis has served as vice principal at Maui Waena Intermediate in Kahului.

This year's honorees will be celebrated at the annual Assistant Principal's Forum and Banquet held in Washington, D.C., March 30 - April 2, 2011. From the state winners, three finalists are selected to become eligible for the National Assistant Principal of the Year award.

Adventures in Traffic Safety

Students are learning about important traffic and pedestrian safety habits without leaving the classroom from Safety Officer Sam. The online super-hero is part of Adventures in Traffic Safety, the state's first locally based online traffic safety program produced by Farmers Insurance Hawaii for Hawaii's public elementary schools. The

program includes age-appropriate activities for grades K-6.

The online program addresses pedestrian safety practices, as well as passenger and bicycle safety. Schools with a minimum of 75% participation of their student body will receive \$200 for their traffic safety programs.



"Keeping our keiki safe, especially crossing busy streets and

intersections going to and from school and after-school activities, is a community-wide priority," said Michele Saito, president of Farmers Insurance Hawaii. "By reinforcing safety messages in a fun way, we can help to make our streets safer statewide."

Agent of Change for STEM Education

Kalama Intermediate teacher Margaret Prevenas has been awarded an Endeavor Fellowship with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA). Endeavor Fellows engage with education experts, NASA scientists and each other to carry back to the classroom a greater understanding of NASA discoveries and to impact student learning in real-world contexts, inspiring the next generation of explorers, scientists, engineers and astronauts.

The Endeavor Science Teaching Certificate Project provides live, online training for K-12 educators working to earn a Certificate in Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) Education from Columbia University in New York. The program helps teachers change their practice as they learn to blend engaging content and methods for more effective instruction.
