


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A "Can You Dig It!" Celebration Kicks off the Summer of Reading

The Hawaii State Public Library System (HSPLS) invited keiki and parents to celebrate the start of the Children's Summer Reading Program (SRP) at a regional kick-off event held at Kapolei Public Library on May 28. Everyone was excited to sign up for the program and got to literally **dig into** a few of the fun things to explore during the summer. See more highlights inside.

... and Communities responded "YES, We Can", and did DIG IT! A total of 27,769 patrons registered for the 2013 SRPs and collectively read 305,885 books in five weeks! Participants signed up at their local library and read a book a week, to receive a free reading incentive. Hawaii's 50 public libraries statewide offered three age-level reading programs for children, teens and adults to delve under the surface of just about anything with free, fun and family-friendly activities. Altogether, the SRP's cost 83 cents a week, per registrant – funded 100% by donations.



The continued success of the SRPs is only made possible by our supporting "communities" – sponsors, performance artists, volunteers, and library staff – that embrace HSPLS's mission to promote literacy by nurturing the love of reading and life-long learning by advocating STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Math) education initiatives wherever possible.

• Lifeline Program Sponsors: Friends of the Library of Hawaii and 42 public and private sponsors generously contributed monetary and in-kind donations valued at \$115,807 to cover all program components, excluding staffing.

• Outstanding Performance Programs: 52 performances presented at libraries throughout the State added cultural and artistic dimensions to the reading programs and drew nearly 5,000 attendees.

• Devoted Volunteers: We relied on volunteers to support the SRPs, which included over 270 teens who contributed 4,400 hours, Friends groups, Girl Scouts, 15 Craigside and many dedicated others.

 Knowledgeable and Dedicated Library Staff: All strived to incorporate STEAM elements into their programs in novel ways to spark excitement for reading and learning.

The Children's SRP (pre-K to 6th grade) explored all things underground and undersea with the "Dig Into Reading" theme and captivated 17,840 children who cumulatively read 241,211 books.

This year's trial of an interactive reading incentive was embraced and appreciated for providing keiki with a hands-on learning activity for the summer. Growing the gardening kit – seeds, biodegradable pot, potting soil and planting instructions - enticed keiki to read and learn more about gardening, composting (including with worms) and science to "grow and expand" their young minds.

Program Benefits Our reading program ranks high in growing bonds among ohana by getting the whole family involved along with our other key program objectives, Growth/ based on 1,137 evaluations Achievement received from parents and 22% caregivers of participants.

We were interested to see the impact of our Children's SRP on all communities statewide

and compared our participation's footprint with the population statistics from the Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism's 2012 State Data Book (with estimates for 2013 growth in the number of children between 3-12 years old). We estimated that the 2013 Children's SRPs, provided by our 50 public libraries, served 10% of children (3-12 years) for the entire State of Hawaii, and up to 14% on Kauai.

Performance Programs Grew Crowds

Outstanding storytellers and performing artists continued to draw crowds with the 52 performances statewide attracting nearly 5,000 patrons, and as many as 325 patrons for a program. Audiences were wowed by intriguing storytellers Bento Rakugo, and Dave Del Rocco; performance extraordinaires Kenny Endo Taiko Ensemble, magician Alan Arita and Uncle Wayne Watkins & the Howling Dog Band; the loveable Ronald McDonald and his "It's Book

Time!" event along with other special performers and presenters featured at selected libraries with the support of their respective Friends groups.

The majority of the performances were coordinated through the University of Hawaii at Manoa's Outreach College,

Statewide Cultural Extension Program, and supplemented with funding from the Hawaii State Foundation on Culture and the Arts and the National Endowment for the Arts.

The Teen SRP (7th graders to 2013 high school graduates) uncovered finds beneath the surface of the earth, popular culture, and other cool stuff, and drew 3,211 teens who cumulatively read 24,037 books.

The Adult SRP (18 years and older) delved into books that have made a literary, scientific or personal impact and attracted 6,718 adults who cumulatively read 40,637 books.

Participation has skyrocketed 216% from five years ago. Many parents and caregivers shared (in the 1,256 evaluations submitted) that they initially enrolled to be an example for their children and then found themselves loving the added family time spent together.
