




My voice matters in state decisions 2016


Overall the system that implements and supports the Six Priority Strategies (i.e., the State with the CAS and CAST, and then with the Principals and Schools) works well.

The CAS directs resources (e.g., people and money) to the Priority Strategies in greatest need.




