### d. Arguments in support of the recommendation

The change in bell schedule requested by Konawaena Middle School for 2012-2013 school year will allow the school to:

- Provide two (2) days for assessment of student learning through performance activities. One (1) day is designated for students in 7<sup>th</sup> grade, and one (1) day for students in the 8<sup>th</sup> grade.
- Require that only the grade level being evaluated attend school to present their research findings to a panel of judges who will determine student academic as well as achievement of the General Learner Outcomes (GLO).
- Conduct culminating activities that require students to provide evidence of their work presented orally.

In the previous school year, 96% of the 7<sup>th</sup> graders and 95% of the 8<sup>th</sup> graders presented their research to the panels and were evaluated using a rubric that incorporated the requirements for the projects as well as how well they were able to communicate their results to the panel. The evidence of their work included reflection on how well they thought they accomplished the general learner outcomes. 91% of the students achieved a satisfactory rating on the rubric used for the assessment.

D. Please provide additional information (data and narrative) for the following type of request applicable:

Since 1998 Konawaena Middle School has required 8<sup>th</sup> grade students to complete an exit project called, "Kulia". This continues to be a rigorous and relevant activity for our students and will prepare them to complete the Senior Project and attain the BOE diploma.

Each year, Konawaena Middle School has asked for the waiver to allow us to convene the panels to which the students present their findings. It is an integral part of the project which holds students accountable for their research and allows them to reflect on their future. Without the faculty participation as panelists, we would not be able to complete the assessment part of the Kulia project. Our 7<sup>th</sup> graders complete a more guided research and career exploration project which also includes a presentation to panelists. This project called, Ka Honua Maoli, "Real World" provides them with the experience they will need to complete the more independent Kulia project as 8<sup>th</sup> graders. To do this effectively, Konawaena Middle School needs the time to complete the assessments by having school days where only the students presenting to the panels are present at school, freeing the faculty to serve on the panels that assess the students' projects.

With the push state-wide for rigor, relevance and relationships in school curriculum, instruction, and assessment these projects and the assessment of them meet the criteria of measuring "learner engagement", "personal skill development" and "stretch learning".

Explanation: As of the writing of this waiver, zero students are failing a grade level because we are only in the first quarter. Konawaena Middle School has began rigorous Math tutorials in which we have 13 small groups of students working with the ALEKS math program to improve mathematical knowledge and success on the HSA. The tutorials just started this past week so results are not in yet in terms of data regarding progress of students. The philosophy of keeping the tutorial groups small (9 to 18 students) per teacher and having them engage with a scientifically research-based program such as ALEKS Math, should yield positive results for our students.
