This School Status and Improvement Report has been prepared as part of the Department's education accountability system to provide regular, understandable accounts of our schools' performance and progress, as required by §302A-1004, Hawai'i Revised Statutes.

School Description

Mililani High School, located on forty-five acres of state property in lush Central Oahu, was established in September 1973 and graduated its first class in June 1977. The town of Mililani is a planned suburban, upper-middle class community with wide, tree-lined streets and well-tended homes and yards. The school currently services approximately 2,500 students in grades 9 –12. The student body comprises a full spectrum of military and local students from diverse ethnicities and socio-economic levels. The feeder school to Mililani High School is Mililani Middle School. Elementary schools in the area include Kipapa Elementary, Mililani Ike, Mililani Mauka, Mililani Uka, and Mililani Waena.

Mililani High School is committed to providing a rigorous and comprehensive education for all students. The school offers a great breadth of academic courses and programs of study, ranging from over a dozen Advanced Placement courses to inclusion and special education classes, to a wide array of electives in the areas of art, music, world languages, industrial arts, business, family and consumer science, physical education, and career and technology education. Students are also encouraged and afforded opportunities to participate in the school's numerous co-curricular activities, community service clubs and sports teams.

We, the faculty and staff at Mililani High School, envision our school as a safe, nurturing learning community that guides and supports all its members in their efforts to become knowledgeable, responsible, productive citizens. 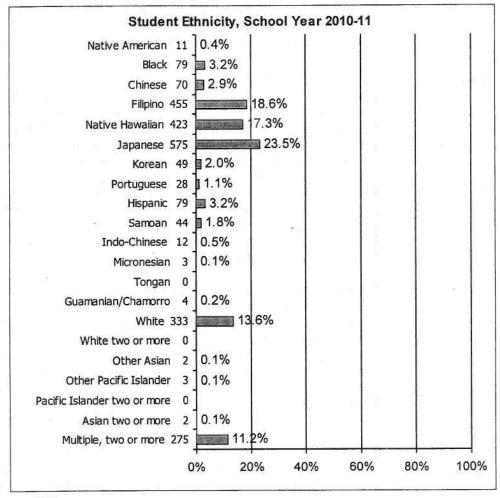

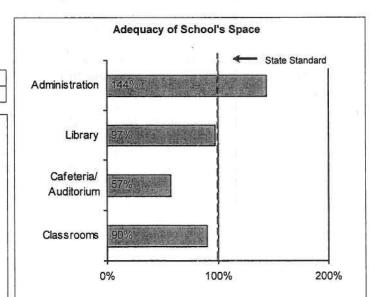

School facilities inspection results

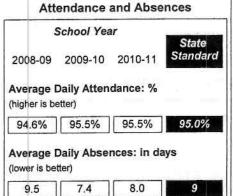
