





Free student meals

To support food security at six Maui schools (including Lahaina)

- Students at six Maui schools receiving free school meals for remainder of 2023-24 school year under temporary Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) program.
- Extends free school meals for Lahaina schools that were previously supported by private donors.
- USDA approved a CEP waiver to qualify the schools mid-year based on current conditions.

2024 Hawai'i School Counselor of the Year Kaimiloa Elementary School

Shely Chang of Kaimiloa Elementary was recognized as Hawai'i School Counselor of the Year in the annual national ceremony in Washington, D.C., on Feb. 1.

The Pearl City High graduate was instrumental in developing a School Attendance Review Team at her school to combat chronic absenteeism.

She also received her National Board for Professional Teaching Standards certification.

21 teachers honored for earning National Board for Professional Teaching Standards certification

- The newest cohort of National Board Certified Teachers (NBCT) was recognized on Feb. 10.
- In addition to the 21 newly certified teachers, 83 educators renewed their NBCT certifications.
- 789 teachers now hold this designation in Hawai'i.
- The state ranks 12th in the nation for the percentage of NBCTs.
