#### **UPDATE**

The attached presentation highlights key milestones and achievements for the Department of Education (Department): update on the supplemental operating and capital improvement project budget requests for fiscal year 2024-2025, update on 2024 legislative proposals and priorities, and recent awards and recognitions for Department students and employees.

#### **Key Legislative Outcomes of the 2024 Legislative Session**

The Department emerged from this legislative session with notable successes highlighting its commitment to protecting student safety, reducing administrative burdens for schools, and meeting our financial obligations. Bills such as HB 2400, mandating the forfeiture of teaching licenses for educators if they resign or retire while under investigation for abuse, and SB 2475, establishing the Harm to Student Registry, reflect proactive measures to ensure student safety. HB 2577 would reduce the need for weekly COVID-19 reporting and SB 2070 would ease the administrative burden for schools looking to procure Career Technical Education (CTE) related purchases.

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Moreover, the allocation of emergency appropriation funding for food service and the truing up of funding for charter schools addresses the Department's existing financial responsibilities.

Overall, the Department is grateful for the partnership with the Legislature in actions that reflect a strong dedication to advancing education and supporting the well-being of Hawaii's students.

#### Department's legislative bills that passed:

- HB 2577 Removes the weekly COVID-19 online publishing requirements. Given
  the prevalence of the COVID-19 vaccine and the changes in health guidance
  provided by the Hawaii State Department of Health and the Centers for Disease
  Control, this report is no longer serving its intended purpose and the removal of this
  reporting requirement would decrease administrative burdens on schools.
- <u>SB 2070</u> Creates an exemption from the procurement code for CTE-related goods and services. This bill will reduce administrative burdens on procurement for schools.
- HB 2400 Requires the forfeiture of the teaching license for a teacher who resigns while an investigation of physical or sexual abuse is pending. This bill aims to address a loophole in the education system by requiring teachers who have resigned or retired in lieu of termination, especially due to serious allegations such as sexual harassment or physical harm of a student, must forfeit their teaching license. This will prevent potentially harmful teachers from continuing their careers elsewhere without consequences.
- <u>SB 3091</u> \$20m emergency appropriation for food service operations. Largely due to inflationary cost increases, the Department has accumulated a deficit of over \$20 million for its school food service operations. In the school year 2022 to 2023, more than eighty percent of the Department's food costs increased by 42%, resulting in the need for additional funds. For many students, a school meal is their only regular source of food.
- <u>SB 3092</u> \$6.6m emergency appropriation for charter school true-up. The
  Department is required to provide proportional funding to charter schools based on
  their student enrollment. A combination of higher enrollment in public charter
  schools and an error in the calculation of this funding resulted in the need for
  additional funding in this fiscal year.

#### Additional priority Department bills that passed:

 HB 1827 - Provides funding for health care workforce programs including funding to retrofit classrooms. This bill will support the existing partnership with Healthcare Association of Hawaii to increase access to healthcare training for all students, providing our students with the requisite skills to enter the healthcare workforce pipeline. - SB 3207 Removes sunset date on Superintendent's salary cap. Without the removal of the sunset date, the Superintendent's salary would have reverted to \$150,000 which would have impacted the salaries of deputy superintendents, assistant superintendents, and complex area superintendents as their salaries cannot exceed that of the Superintendent's.
- HB 2074 Provides funding and positions for Kaiapuni programs for FY25. The
  continued growth of the Kaiapuni program to service 2,374 students across 22
  Department schools warrants the need for additional positions and funding.
- SB 2475 Creates the Harm to Student Registry that will note any school employee, contractor or volunteer at a school who has had a final finding of abuse of a student. Increasing the ability of both private and public pre K-12 educational institutions to communicate and provide vital information to consider in rendering employment decisions is critically important to maintaining healthy and safe learning environments for all of Hawaii's keiki.

The state's supplemental budget for FY2025 is represented in House Bill 1800:

• HB 1800 - The Department is grateful for the appropriation of \$151,602,747 for FY2025. While funding was included for items such as increased funding for our weighted student formula and for summer learning hubs, these appropriations were made as a non-recurring line item. About 50% of the FY2025 appropriation is non-recurring, representing funding for FY2025 only. Our intention is to work with the Governor to address continuing funding in the next biennium budget. Deferred maintenance projects will require major investments to address the various projects at our schools. I am working with our Office of Facilities and Operations to revamp our assessments and path forward, and collaborating closely with our team to improve the process for our CIP program. Finally, the Department did not receive any CIP funds as a "lump sum" to address Compliance-related projects.

The Legislature has transmitted all bills, including the budget, to the Governor for his final review. The Governor must inform the Legislature of his intent to veto any bills by June 25, 2024. The Governor must sign bills by July 10, 2024 or the bills will become law without his signature.

- 1. \$142,034,487 or 72% of DOE Budget Requests were funded, examples include:
  - Summer Learning Hubs \$20,990,000 (non-recurring)
  - Bus Contracts \$18,266,346
  - Food Services \$18,000,000
  - Electricity \$15,000,000 (non-recurring)
- 1. \$56,116,778 or 28% of DOE Budget Requests were **NOT funded**, examples include:
  - Middle School Athletics \$5,000,000
  - Vulnerable Populations and English Learner Programs \$2,749,624
  - Mathematics Innovation \$1,974,578
  - School-Based Behavioral Health \$1,789,680
- 1. \$9,568,260 was added by the Legislature for FY25 only (non-recurring):
  - Enhance School Security \$5,000,000
  - Career and Technical Education Teacher Differentials \$2,500,000
  - Healthy and Ready to Learn Program \$1,300,000
  - Computer Science Courses for Teachers \$500,000
  - Seal of Biliteracy \$268,260

  - b. Clean up the budget where needed (funds appropriated in the wrong program areas); and
  - c. Incorporate collective bargaining funding (for FY23-25) into the DOE budget
- 2. Requests to:
  - a. Fund the numerous recurring items funded on a non-recurring basis by the 2024 Legislature;
  - b. Address inflation for programs to maintain current levels of service; and
  - c. To a limited extent, new requests for new strategic initiatives
- 3. New CIP request process identifying Department-wide priorities

# **2024 Legislative Proposals and Priorities**

- Focus of legislative package: Reducing administrative burden for schools, keeping students safe, addressing financial shortfalls.
- Bills that contain contents of the Department's legislative package and/or bills of interest that the Department has supported are moving to Governor for final approval include:
  - HB 2577 Removes the weekly COVID-19 online publishing requirements.
  - > SB 2070 Creates an exemption from the procurement code for CTE-related purchases.
  - ➤ **HB 2400** Requires the forfeiture of the teaching license for a teacher who resigns while an investigation of physical or sexual abuse is pending.
  - ➤ **SB 2475** Creates the Harm to Student Registry that will note any school employee, contractor or volunteer at a school who has had a final finding of abuse of a student.
