BOARD OF ED. MEETINGS

November 7th BOE Meeting

The Student Achievement Committee was given a presentation on Special Education in the Pearl City-Waipahu Complex Area. Waipahu Elementary Principal, Mr. Hui, shared Waipahu Elementary's model for inclusion classrooms (classes with regular and special education students). They have two models: 1. Co-teaching classrooms that consist of one regular education teacher and one special education teacher (15 co-teaching classes) 2. Overflow classrooms that consist of one regular education teacher (4 overflow classes) Within these classrooms, small groups of students work with the teacher while the rest of the students work on their classwork independently. These models are supportive and inclusive for special education students who are transitioning into regular education classes and becoming more independent in their learning.

The committee also received a presentation on the annual reporting of the indicators for Goal 1 (Student Success). To see the data and indicator updates visit boe.hawaii.gov under the agenda for November 7: Student Achievement Committee.



HAWAII STATE STUDENT **COUNCIL MEETING #3**

The Hawaii State Student Council received a presentation on the Na Hopena A'o (HA) framework and update on Board of Education discussion items. Additionally, the HSSC discussed four major student-related topics: mental health concerns, college readiness, community involvement, and student safety. The council is designing and creating an implementation plan to carry out a solution, program, or initiative to one of these four topics. Updates will be sent out as progress is made.

Additionally, the Office of Strategy, Innovation, and Performance gave a presentation and conducted a survey regarding school design, and the Office of Curriculum, Instruction & Student Support gave a presentation and conducted a survey about computer science education within Hawaii.
