SUBJECT: Update on Strategic Plan, Desired Outcome 1.2.3: "All Students Experience

a Nā Hopena A'o (HĀ) Environment for Learning"

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

- Learning experiences designed to ensure safe, nurturing and culturally responsive learning environments can contribute to high quality learning for all (Priority I); and
- Two primary initiatives for developing readiness in culturally responsive learning environments include:
  - Nā Hopena A'o training foci to address three areas of readiness development: 1) HĀ for All, 2) HĀ Assessment for Learning and 3) HĀ Designing for Ready Communities. They are designed to meet learners where they are at and assumes each community experiences current learning environments that align to HĀ. Through a process of storytelling and story catching, indicators of readiness are marked as data points for strengthening HĀ and building a culture of "we."
  - The 'Āina Aloha competencies support educators in strengthening their pilina to 'āina and designing for Hawai'i content through the use of 'ōlelo Hawai'i, Kuana'ike, and Honua. It connects our haumana to their 'aina aloha or beloved place, and supports them to find their identity and HĀ rooted in their place, 'ohana, and larger communities with the goal of empowering them to contribute back in meaningful ways.

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#### 2. <u>DESCRIPTION</u>

In 2014, the Board of Education completed a redraft of the Hawaiian education policy 105.7, which included the establishment of the Office of Hawaiian Education (OHE). In 2015, the Board approved Policy E3, Nā Hopena A'o. Since that time, OHE has focused on the delivery of educational policies, programs, projects and practices (P4) that grounds public education to Hawaiian ways of knowing so that all of Hawai'i may thrive.

The work to date has enabled the Department to preserve the intent of HĀ by upholding the practice of invitation, invitations to learn and invitations to develop readiness for HĀ and 'Āina Aloha competency. As readiness expands to more school communities in School Year.

2023-2024, the Department expects to provide committee reports on the progress being made in a manner that preserves the moʻolelo or story of each community. Those stories represent the qualitative measure of successful, empowered learning design, with local ownership of identity and a strengths-based mindset to achieve as individuals and collective communities.

#### 3. PRESENTATION

Dawn Kau'i Sang, Director for the Office of Hawaiian Education will present an update on the Desired Outcome: "All students experience a Nā Hopena A'o learning environment." (Desired Outcome 1.2.3). The Kailua Kalāheo Complex Area is on a learning journey and will share their moʻolelo of HĀ.



## Areas for focus and improvement

#### State level

- Consider creative solutions to address transportation barriers to access 'āina learning spaces.
- Prioritize funding for on and off campus 'āina learning spaces and ground transportation.

### **Complex area level**

- Offer continuous learning opportunities to address high frequency of staff transitions.
- Set intentions to focus HĀ learning within leadership network meetings for deepening connections to people, place and HĀ.

### School level

- Design integrated learning experiences for student learning.
- Intentionally implement an intentional learning design that includes families in the work of strengthening HĀ for self and for others.
