I first started as a yearbook advisor in 2009. At that time the yearbook costs, including shipping and handling, were below the \$50 allowed. Current base price of a color yearbook is now \$50. I locked in this rate a couple years ago and when our contract expires, it will increase. This does not include shipping and handling and tax. Each year we operate at a loss except when doing fundraising such as selling yearbook accessories. Publishing a yearbook has many factors and the advisors should not have to fundraise just to avoid being at a loss. They should be focused on creating a quality book that showcases the school not cutting out pages to make the budget.

Schools in the mainland have already increased their prices and start at \$75. These schools are much closer to the printing plants so they actually pay less in transit freight.

I encourage the Finance Committee to increase the prices so the schools can have a small buffer and to update aging photo equipment. Most schools like mine only get funds based on the number of students in the class and most of the time it's under \$100 that we use on supplies. It is not enough for equipment. I try to apply for grants and places like Donor's Choose to update equipment.

As the Student Government President of the second-largest public high school in Hawai'i, and a Title I school, I am fortunate that I do not have to worry too much about funds for my student activities. In Waipahu High School's Student Government, we plan activities almost every week to promote students' school spirit and sense of belonging. Since the start of the school year, we've had activities like bracelet making, sign-waving, assemblies, and Club Rush. Each event utilizes our student activities funding: the beads and elastic for the bracelets, the poster paper and paint for the signs, the balloons, streamers, and banner paper for the assemblies, and the snacks for Club Rush. At first glance, it doesn't seem costly, but costs add up. For schools with smaller populations, it is challenging to plan and successfully execute activities when they are only provided with a maximum of \$10 per student for the entire school year.

As a resident of Hawai'i, I hear and see my parents paying more for everything. From gasoline to eggs, prices have risen in the past couple of years. Why have our student activity fees remained the same for over 25 years? Our advisors and councils are not immune to inflation, but we have been given the same amount of money to budget since 1998. However, this gives them the ability to charge more for the welfare of the students they serve.

I am Treytin Cabral, a Senior at Mililani High School, and as the Student Body President of Mililani High School, I write in strong support of fee increases as outlined in the memo from Superintendent Hayashi I had the opportunity to testify on this same matter earlier this year when this item was on the agenda of this committee. I was a junior, but still a part of the student activities program at Mililani High. Now as Student Body President, I see in greater depth the financial constraint the current cap on student activities fees creates. As time goes on, it becomes increasingly apparent that commodities and goods no longer cost the same as they did when the last cap for student fees was enforced.

As a third year member of the student council, I have seen times where we are forced to make some difficult decisions when it comes to planning some of our events. For example, supplying a DJ for our events costs more than twice as much as it did a decade ago. Or even as we are currently in the process of planning our Homecoming festivities, we are finding that our traditional small gift that goes out to all students ends up taking up a decent portion of their paid dues. Annually, we also participate with the DOE in events such as Unity Day or Purple Up Day, and I have seen teachers spending money out of their own pockets to engage students in causes that truly matter.

On the student body council, which I am extremely proud to be a part of, we have the unique privilege to give back to our peers, and create a high school experience that they will carry with them for a long time to come. We make this happen through events ranging from spirit weeks, homecoming, appreciation days/weeks, giveaways, leadership development events, and even events where we get to interact with our complex schools. The work done by student activity programs across the state goes beyond just the students. We also have the fantastic opportunity to give back to staff members, teachers, and communities too that have given us so much. We highly value our bond with our Mililani Community, and we enjoy the opportunities we get within student activities to interact with and give back to the community that we grew up in. The relationship and bond between the schools and communities becomes even stronger with these very events and interactions, and the importance and impact of these relationships cannot be understated.

I firmly believe that it is important to not only keep these crucial events and relationships, but continue to elevate them for years to come. As a student leader, I believe in the power of giving back. In the end, this matter is much more than just a simple raise to a fee. It will go on to affect the way that we are able to give back to the community that we are rooted in, and has given us so much. This fee increase is an investment in the futures of Hawaii's keiki. This increase will ensure that as time goes on, the youth of the future will have the same opportunity as I did to connect with their community, which will in turn inspire more of that giving back that makes a profound impact. Furthermore, as costs continue to soar, it is crucial to meet that need with this very increase in funds. Thank you for your attention and consideration to this very important matter.

My name is Zachary Espino, and I submit this testimony in **strong SUPPORT** of Agenda Item VI, Maximum Allowable Co-Curricular Student Activity Fees, which proposes to increase the maximum fees that schools may charge.

I am a proud graduate of the Hawai'i public school system. I served as Student Body President at Kailua High School and Vice Chairperson of the Hawai'i State Student Council during my senior year of high school, and I participated in student council throughout all of my middle school and high school years. These experiences shaped my leadership journey and showed me how essential adequate funding is for a strong student activities program.

I attended Title I schools, so I saw firsthand how student fees can be challenging for many families. I remember classmates who worried about being left out of activities because of costs. Our student activities coordinators and school leaders always worked creatively to help so every student could participate. Their efforts proved that when resources are limited, schools must stretch to make sure no one is excluded.

Serving a school of about 850 students, I also witnessed how the ceiling on student activity fees limited what we could offer. From campus-wide events to leadership training, every opportunity relied on fees that have not increased since 2004.

The Department of Education proposal to raise the maximum allowable fees is a practical and necessary step. It simply updates the ceiling, allowing schools to adjust if needed while still giving principals the ability to charge less or provide waivers so that every student can take part.

Approving this adjustment will allow schools to maintain and expand co-curricular programs that build leadership, foster community, and enrich the student experience just as these programs did for me.

I respectfully ask the Board of Education to adopt the proposed increases under Agenda Item VI so that future student leaders can enjoy the same opportunities that shaped my own path.

Aloha members of the Finance and Infrastructure Committee,

The costs of goods and services, especially post-pandemic, have continued to rise. However, funding via student activity fees have not changed to meet this since 1998. I am in support of the proposed fee increases by the Department of Education.

We have seen over the years that schools have been able to raise the price of event bids and graduation participation fees since that could be done at the school level. We need your help (and approval) to do the same for student activity fees, which is the sole source of funding for our schools' student activities programs. These funds could help provide leadership training opportunities for student leaders, bring in guest speakers, provide more funding for giveaways or student recognition, hire vendors, and so much more. Just this past year, school bus prices have more than doubled (for example, a bus that was once \$250 now costs \$550 to rent for a group to do a field trip, limiting many clubs and organizations, let alone classes, ability to complement learning and opportunities via off campus excursions). This is just one example of many areas that have seen a cost increase.

The student fees increase can also help smaller schools that bring in even less money through fee collection. It will increase the capacity of our clubs and grade level organizations to provide more for their peers. As a co-advisor at Mililani High School, we exhaust our budget annually through numerous events ranging from school wide assemblies to Homecoming, Award Recognition, Spirit Weeks, Appreciation days, giveaways, and so much more to increase student and staff morale and keep our school community engaged. We've had to work really hard, seek donations at times, and fundraise to stretch our dollars. There is the old adage, "You get what you pay for," and at times, this may be true; quality and long term investments are sacrificed at the expense of a cheaper alternative because we are limited by our budget. In the business world, this type of practice will lead to customer dissatisfaction and at times, higher costs in the long run. I believe our customers, the students, deserve better in a school year at the expense of what may amount to two Starbucks runs in a week - an increase of \$10 in student fees can go a long way in any category.

This fee increase is long overdue in supporting our school programs and the students we serve. It will alleviate some of the cost constraints we face and allow our schools to redirect efforts and focus back on implementation of activities for our students. This memo includes many other fees in areas that have seen production costs go up (ie. Graduation Cap and Gown, Yearbook, Newspaper, School Lunches). I support the Board of Education increasing these fee caps to meet the economic realities we are facing.
