#### 1. <u>EXECUTIVE SUMMARY</u>

Despite the mass route suspensions last year, the Hawaii State Department of Education (Department) has been proactively working with bus contractors, schools, and county partners to mitigate the effects of the ongoing driver workforce shortage. By exploring and utilizing alternative transportation methods, the Department has been able to maintain student access to schools despite the ongoing driver shortage.







## **Driver recruitment efforts**

- Starting pay \$25-27/hour for SPED van drivers; \$35/hour for CDL drivers (no experience).
- Paid training, guaranteed minimum of 22-25 hours, and sign-on bonuses between \$1,000 and \$3,000.
- Frequent job postings on company websites, Indeed,
   and ZipRecruiter to make applying easy and convenient.
- Paid partnerships with KHON2 and Pacific Media Group for ad space on TV and radio.
- Partnerships with the Hawai'i State Department of Education at school job fairs and career expos.

### Statewide Participation - 6,307 students


- Kaua'i 99 students

### Middle/Intermediate School Participation – 694 students

- New option this school year
- Middle/intermediate schools still have school bus service

#### **High School Participation – 5,613 students**

- 89% of total EXPRESS applicants
- 14 O'ahu high schools do not use school bus service
- Leeward O'ahu District schools have highest participation

## GoKid carpool pilot

- 260 families (3%) have registered for GoKid.
